Putin calls for a project to promote 'traditional Russian values' overseas

MOSCOW (AP) — Russian President Vladimir Putin on Tuesday called for the government to develop a program for overseas promotion of "traditional Russian spiritual and moral values," a theme that the Kremlin has increasingly sounded in recent years.

In an order published on the Kremlin website, Putin instructed officials responsible for national projects to allot an unspecified amount of money for a program called "Russia in the World."

The program would be aimed toward "developing international youth cooperation and promoting traditional Russian spiritual and moral values abroad," the order said.

- "See what they do with their own peoples - the destruction of the family, cultural and national identity, perversion, mockery of children and pedophilia are declared the norm."

- "Look at the Holy Scriptures...the family is a union of a man and a woman."

- "The Anglican Church, for example, considers the idea of a genderneutral God...forgive us, Lord, for they don't know what they do."



- "We must protect our children."

The discrepancy between the propaganda headlines spreading on social media and reality about Russia's sexual abuses is stark. For example, Russia is one of the few countries that hasn't criminalized the possession of child pornography or domestic violence.



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Margarita Gracheva asked for protection. Law enforcement failed her.

After her husband had dragged her into the woods behind their home and threatened her with a knife, the mother of two called the police. It was not the first time she had reported abuse, but, under Russian law, her abuser could not be arrested unless the abuse was so violent that she would be hospitalized. Three months later, the police received a call saying that Gracheva's hands had been <u>cut off</u> with an ax. Only then was her husband arrested. Russia: Where keeping child porn is legal

Keen, bright-eyed and earnest, the little boy answers the Russian investigator's questions enthusiastically, as if describing a cartoon, not sexual abuse.

"He took off my underwear and photographed me," says the victim, whom Russian authorities are not allowing to be identified.

The boy goes on to describe sexual abuse at the hands of his own father. Without this testimony, child advocates say, it would be impossible to convict the man, whose trial begins later this year.

In Russia, possessing child pornography is not a crime and laws that govern child exploitation are weak. Government authorities say the majority of sexual crimes against children are never reported or investigated.

Those are among the reasons that even the Russian government admits the country is a world leader in the production of child pornography.

Russia parliament votes 380-3 to decriminalize domestic violence

Russia's parliament voted 380-3 on Friday to decriminalize domestic violence in cases where it does not cause "substantial bodily harm" and does not occur more than once a year.

The move, which eliminates criminal liability in such cases, makes a violation punishable by a fine of roughly \$500, or a 15-day arrest, provided there is no repeat within 12 months.

The bill now goes to the rubber-stamp upper chamber, where no opposition is expected. It then must be signed by President Vladimir Putin, who has signaled his support.

In 2021, leaked videos showed systemic torture and rape in Russian jails, and Russian forces often apply the same rules in the army as in prisons. In Nov 2022, the late Yevgeny Prigozhin, may he rot in Hell, even wanted to create...

Alexei Makarov says prison staff knew about the abuse he suffered

Former inmates have spoken to the BBC about being systematically raped and tortured in Russian prisons. Leaked footage of such abuse was circulated by an insider last year, and now victims have told the BBC why it happens and how they are fighting for justice.

Saratov prison hospital, in south-west Russia, came to public attention last year when videos of horrifying prisoner abuse were leaked to a human rights organisation and reported on by the international media.

Alexei Makarov knew its reputation before he was transferred there in 2018 as part of a six-year sentence for assault. Prisoners who are sent to Saratov from other jails in the region have complained that medical grounds were fabricated so they could be tortured behind closed doors. Russian prisons have almost no independent oversight, and prison hospitals - with their health quarantine rules - even less so.

She was 17 when the attack happened on a Saturday morning last September in the family's field of yams and cassava in Ngaguene village, near the Central African Republic (CAR) town of Bouar.

"Whenever we tried to scream for help, they used their hands to cover our mouths so that nobody could hear us," she says.

Russian mercenaries behind slaughter of 500 in Mali village, UN report finds

Report implicates Wagner group fighters in Moura atrocity, including the torture and rape of civilians

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First came a single helicopter, flying low over the marshes around the river outside the village, then the rattle of automatic fire scattered the crowds gathered for the weekly market.

Next came more helicopters, dropping troops off around the homes and cattle pens. The soldiers moved swiftly, ordering men into the centre of the village, gunning down those trying to escape. When some armed militants fired back, the shooting intensified. Soon at least 20 civilians and a dozen alleged members of an al-Qaida affiliated Islamist group, were dead.

Over the next five days, hundreds more would die in the village of Moura in the Mopti region of Mali at the hands of troops overseen by Russian mercenaries, according to a new <u>United Nations</u> report. All but a small fraction were unarmed civilians.

A rapist freed from an eight year jail sentence and pardoned by Vladimir **Putin** so he could fight in Ukraine has been detained again after allegedly sexually assaulting a 14-year-old girl.

Nikolai Nechaev, 38, from the city of Perm, is the latest of dozens of prisoners, including murderers and rapists, freed by Putin, to have committed new offences after serving in his forces and having their jail terms personally annulled by the dictator.

Nachaev was previously convicted of a 2019 rape, among other crimes.

He fought for **Russia** in Ukraine for six months ending in November, when he was fully pardoned from his previous **crime**.

Only three months later, in February, he is believed to have targeted his next victim.



When releasing them back in Russian society, Prigozhin gently asked them "not to drink too much" and "not to rape women". But they are of course former criminals and war criminals, now carrying additional trauma from the war, and many soon return to crime.

A soldier, 42, who fought for **Putin** in Ukraine raped two schoolgirls the day after he returned home from his military service, say police.

The suspected paedophile threatened girls aged ten and 12 that he would blow them up with a grenade unless they submitted to him.

Wearing the uniform of 'convicts' army **Wagner**, he approached them near their school in Novosibirsk and forced them behind garages where he sexually attacked them.

The girls told their parents about the alleged rapes and said the man was wearing military fatigues and an insignia that matches Wagner private military company - showing a skull.

The so-called "Russian opposition" claims most Russians oppose Putin and support liberal democracy. Yet a recent poll ranked Putin in the top 3 greatest people of all times (with fellow genociders Lenin and Stalin), highlighting the gap between empty rhetoric and reality.

Brussels – As repression in Russia escalates, three opposition figures appeal to the EU not to abandon those still resisting. Yulia Navalnaya, widow of Alexei Navalny, Vladimir Kara-Murza, and Ilya Yashin, spoke in the European Parliament, calling for a change of approach in supporting Russia's democratic forces. These were not merely symbolic statements: the activists presented concrete indications of what they expected from the European institutions.

During the joint session of the European Parliament Foreign Affairs Committee and the Subcommittee on Human Rights this morning (June 5), Navalnaya called on the EU to move beyond the stage of declarations and **start tangible support for Russian civil society**. In particular, she raised questions about the EUR 5.5 million allocated for **Radio Free Europe**, an American broadcaster, and asked why there was no similar funding for Russian media in exile. "Russian newspapers that have been operating outside the country for years, speaking to the public in Russian, doing vital work, and barely surviving. **Why are they not supported?**" she asked, offering a list of newspapers, activists, and specific projects.

According to Navalnaya, there are millions of Russian citizens opposed to the war in Ukraine, but to play a role, they should receive support now. Proposals include keeping the issue of **political prisoners** visible, offering aid to human rights defenders, supporting technologies such as VPN and free digital spaces, and strengthening connections with those acting within the country. "Small concrete projects are needed, **not just big proclamations**," she stressed.

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Here's an example of "the great and profound Russian culture": an intercepted call where a Russian wife gives her soldier husband her permission to rape Ukrainian women. Sexual violence has long been used as a tool of oppression by Russian and Soviet forces. During World War II, Soviet soldiers were notorious for mass rapes in occupied territories, both in Germany and "liberated" Central and Eastern Europe.

"Nine, ten, twelve men at a time - they rape them on a collective basis."

The Soviet armies advancing into East Prussia in January 1945, in huge, long columns, were an extraordinary mixture of modern and medieval: tank troops in padded black helmets, Cossack cavalrymen on shaggy mounts with loot strapped to the saddle, lend-lease Studebakers and Dodges towing light field guns, and then a second echelon in horse-drawn carts. The variety of character among the soldiers was almost as great as that of their military equipment. There were freebooters who drank and raped quite shamelessly, and there were idealistic, austere communists and members of the intelligentsia appalled by such behaviour.

Beria and Stalin, back in Moscow, knew perfectly well what was going on from a number of detailed reports. One stated that "many Germans declare that all German women in East Prussia who stayed behind were raped by Red Army soldiers". Numerous examples of gang rape were given - "girls under 18 and old women included".

Witnesses provided consistent accounts of ill-treatment and torture carried out during unlawful confinement. Interlocutors described beatings, electric shocks, and forced nudity, as well as other types of violations in detention facilities. After being reportedly transferred into detention in the Russian Federation, some victims had disappeared. In the four areas investigated, the Commission had processed two incidents of illtreatment against Russian Federation soldiers by Ukrainian forces. While few in numbers, such cases continued to be the subject of the Commission's attention.

The Commission had found that some Russian Federation soldiers committed sexual and gender-based violence crimes. There were cases where relatives were forced to witness the crimes. The age of victims of sexual and gendered-based violence ranged from four to 82 years. The Commission had further documented cases in which children had been raped, tortured, unlawfully confined, killed and injured in indiscriminate attacks with explosive weapons. Exposure to repeated explosions, crimes, forced displacement and separation from family members deeply affected their well-being and mental health.

PARIS — Rapes and sexual assaults attributed to Moscow's forces in Ukraine are part of a Russian "military strategy" and a "deliberate tactic to dehumanize the victims," UN envoy Pramila Patten told AFP.

"All the indications are there," the UN special representative on sexual violence told AFP on Thursday, when asked if rape was being used as a weapon of war in Ukraine.

"When women are held for days and raped, when you start to rape little boys and men, when you see a series of genital mutilations, when you hear women testify about Russian soldiers equipped with Viagra, it's clearly a military strategy," she said. MORE RUSSIAN AGGRESSION

Ukrainian sniper Oleksandr Matsievsky was captured by Russians in the first year of the full-scale invasion. Later, a video emerged showing him smoking his last cigarette in a forest, apparently next to a grave he had been forced to dig.

"Glory to Ukraine!" he says to his captors. Moments later, shots ring out and he falls dead.

His execution is one of many.

In October this year, nine captured Ukrainian soldiers were reportedly shot dead by Russian forces in Kursk region. Ukrainian prosecutors are <u>investigating the case</u> including a photo showing half-naked bodies lying on the ground. This photo was enough for one of the victims, drone operator Ruslan Holubenko, to be identified by his parents.

"I recognised him by his underwear," <u>his distraught mother told</u> local broadcaster Suspilne Chernihiv. "I bought it for him before a trip to the sea. I also knew that his shoulder had been shot through. You could see that in the picture."

(CNN) — Roman Gorilyk is now little more than a skeleton. His ribs and collarbones are sticking out, his belly is sunken, his shoulder and hip joints clearly visible under his pale skin.

Gorilyk's extreme emaciation appears to be the result of the two years he spent in <u>Russian</u> <u>captivity</u>. The former checkpoint guard at the <u>Chernobyl nuclear plant</u> in northern Ukraine was detained by Russian troops in March 2022, shortly after Moscow launched its full-scale invasion of Ukraine.

He was finally released on Friday, one of 75 Ukrainians exchanged for 75 Russian prisoners of war.

Serhii Dobrovolskyi, a Ukrainian soldier who had been in Russian captivity since 2023, has died just a month after his release at the end of May as part of a 1000-for-1000 prisoner swap, an official from the soldier's home region announced on June 21.

The case is the latest in a chain of Ukrainian soldiers' unexpected deaths after their return from Russian captivity, highlighting the effects of "widespread and systematic" torture of prisoners of war (POWs) in Russian prisons, reported by the U.N.

"Serhii Dobrovolskyi was released from captivity at the end of May this year. A few days ago, he was met by his fellow townspeople in his hometown," wrote the head of the soldier's native Zdolbuniv district in Rivne Oblast, Vladyslav Sukhliak, on Facebook. The exact cause of death was not immediately announced.

A video **posted** by the Zdolbuniv city council on June 17 shows Dobrovolskyi being greeted in Zdolbuniv by a crowd chanting the Ukrainian anthem as the soldier is hugging his mother. He was also presented with a korovai, a round bread loaf, as part of the symbolic Ukrainian tradition of welcome with bread and salt.

"Finally, after almost two years, the mother hugged her son," the Zdolbuniv city council commented on the video.

Sukhliak added that Dobrovolskyi was 43 years old at the time of death. "The war with the damned (Russian) occupiers takes lives and health of the defenders," he wrote.

Earlier in June, another Ukrainian soldier returned from Russian captivity had died unexpectedly.

Dmytro Shapovalov, a 32-year-old defender of Ukraine who was exchanged in 2023 after over a year in Russian prisons, had died on June 9, according to the Ukrainian public broadcaster **Suspilne**.

And Russians don't make a distinction between combatants and civilians. Ukrainian journalist Viktoriia Roshchyna's body was returned to Ukraine with "numerous signs of torture" and some organs missing, including the brain, eyes and larynx.

Body of Ukrainian journalist who died in Russian detention returned by Moscow with signs of torture and with missing organs

(CNN) — The body of a young Ukrainian woman who <u>died in Russian captivity</u> after being held incommunicado for months was returned to Ukraine showing signs of torture, Ukrainian prosecutors have said.

Kyiv said the remains of journalist Victoria Roshchyna, who went missing during a reporting trip, were returned as part of a body exchange between Ukraine and Russia in February.

Yuriy Belousov, who heads the war crimes department at the Ukrainian Prosecutor General's Office, said that forensic examination found "numerous signs of torture and illtreatment... including abrasions and hemorrhages on various parts of the body, a broken Sign in

Russian troops raped and tortured children in Ukraine, U.N. panel says

Since the beginning of the full-scale Russian invasion in Ukraine, <u>183 children have been killed</u> and <u>342</u> injured. The Ukrainian Parliament's commissioner for human rights Liudmyla Denisova has revealed the facts of how the occupiers brutally rape children. According to her, an <u>11-year-old</u> boy was raped in front of his mother in <u>Bucha town</u> while she was tied to a chair. A <u>14-year-old</u> girl was raped by five men. Babel editor-in-chief Eugene Spirin spoke with psychologist and psychiatrist Liliya Shakalova, who now works with two raped girls, aged nine and eleven. They were taken out of the settlements near Kyiv, which were occupied by the Russian soldiers. Both girls are now safe, they are with their parents, and are undergoing therapy. We do not name the children and publish just a fragment of this conversation. The content is very graphic, please be aware of this. Are you currently working with children who were raped?

I have two such clients, both are girls. Their parents approached me. Yes, they
are children and this is a deep trauma. I've been working with them for a week
already.

How old are they?

— One girl is 9, the second is 11 years old. The first one was wounded very, very badly. It has already been stitched up. The second girl is suspected of being pregnant because she already had periods before, but doesn't have any now. Though it may be so because she's too stressed. This girl is now supervised by a gynecologist. This girl was stitched up earlier, while her settlement still was occupied. The locals managed to find a doctor living there.

Definition

Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide

- 1. Killing members of the group;
- 2. Causing serious bodily or mental harm to members of the group;
- 3. Deliberately inflicting on the group conditions of life calculated to bring about its physical destruction in whole or in part;
- 4. Imposing measures intended to prevent births within the group;
- 5. Forcibly transferring children of the group to another group.



Despite the International Criminal Court arrest warrant for Putin and Maria Lvova-Belova and despite Zelenskyy's insistence in negotiations, Russia has refused to return the abducted kids back to Ukraine. You can check our video on the topic below:

Why Mongolia Won't Arrest Vladimir Putin

Mongolia will be the first ICC member-state to host the Russian leader since the court issued a warrant for his arrest.

On September 3, Mongolia is set to test Thucydides' <u>famous observation</u> that the "strong do what they can and the weak suffer what they must." According to the <u>Kremlin</u>, Russian President Vladimir Putin is scheduled to visit Mongolia to honor the 85th anniversary of the Mongolia-Russia joint victory on the Khalkhin Gol River against Imperial Japan in 1939.

The visit is notable because, in March 2023, the International Criminal Court (ICC) issued an <u>arrest warrant</u> against Putin following the war in Ukraine, accusing him of the war crimes of unlawful deportation and transportation of children in the occupied territory of Ukraine. Putin is the first head of a permanent member state in the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) to get an arrest warrant from the ICC.

Mongolia, as a member of the ICC and a <u>signatory</u> of the Rome Statute, is supposed to honor ICC's arrest warrants. But it is unlikely that Putin will get arrested in Mongolian territory, as Mongolia continues to depend heavily on Russian energy.

The war helps Putin's domestic popularity and helps him control the Russian population. Another reason why ending the war could be dangerous for him is the sheer number of dangerous convicts and war criminals now paid good wages: if the war ends, they come back to Russia.

Russia plans to build 25 prisons and three forced labor camps in occupied areas of Ukraine

The Kremlin is aiming to deepen its control of <u>Russian-occupied</u> <u>zones in Ukraine</u> by building a large prison network. The Russian government is planning to build 25 prisons and three forced labor camps in the <u>four territories it illegally annexed last</u> <u>year</u>: Zaporizhzhia, Kherson, Donetsk and Luhansk. The main goal of the plan is to control the population in these areas. To achieve this objective, Moscow has also officially created a new department of the federal security service (FSB) in the eastern region of Donetsk.

Torture of children

After the city and part of the Kherson region were liberated from the Russian occupation, 10 torture chamber were discovered there. One of them had a room, that was used for detaining and torturing children, Dmytro Lubinets, the Ukrainian Parliament Commissioner for Human Rights, reported.

"According to the testimony of the people who were held there, Ukrainian children were in this room. The occupiers themselves called it a "children's cell," said Lubinets.

The children were given little water and almost no food. Dmytro Lubinets also reported that they were subjected to psychological abuse. For instance, children were told that parents had abandoned them.

According to Lubinets, a 14-year-old boy was held captive and tortured there for taking photos of destroyed Russian military equipment.

"We recorded the torture of children for the first time. I thought that the bottom could not be broken after Bucha, Irpin," said the Ukrainian Parliament Commissioner for Human Rights. "No. We really reached the bottom in Kherson."

Ukrainians who want to leave cities under Russian occupation cannot do so without undergoing a terrifying process known as filtration. Phones are searched, social media accounts scoured. Anything deemed incriminating can lead to beatings, civilians say, and many are forcefully sent to Russia. Russia is systematically torturing Ukrainian prisoners of war (POWs) and civilians held in Russian detention. The Ukrainian Media Initiative for Human Rights (MIHR) published a report on April 29 detailing how Russia has used Soviet-era torture practices, including beatings, humiliation, electric shocks, and dog attacks, against Ukrainian POWs and civilian prisoners.[9] MIHR based the report on the testimonies of 138 freed Ukrainian POWs who the Russians detained in 2022-2025. The report notably coheres with a UN Office of the High Commissioner on Human Rights (UN OHCHR) assessment from October 2024 that assessed that Russian authorities have subjected Ukrainian POWs to torture, ill-treatment, and inhumane conditions "in a widespread and systematic manner."[10] The UN OHCHR report also noted that it is highly likely that the Russian military command is aware of the treatment of Ukrainian POWs and that Russian state entities may be coordinating the use of torture. UN High Commissioner on Human Rights Volker Türk noted that there is significant coordination on the poor treatment of the POWs and prisoners among various Russian entities, specifically the Russian Federal Security Service (FSB) and the Russian Federal Penitentiary Service (FSIN).[11] Russia's abuse of Ukrainians in detention is notably not exclusive to POWs. The Ukrainian Ombudsman's Office confirmed on April 28 that Russia is illegally detaining almost 16,000 civilians in occupied territories and at least 1,800 civilians in Russia, and it is likely that Russian agents are torturing many of these detainees.[12] Russia recently returned the body of Ukrainian journalist Viktoriya Roshchyna, whom Russia detained while she was investigating Russian detention centers in occupied Ukraine, with "extensive damage to the coronary arteries" and missing organs, a sign that Russian authorities were trying to obfuscate evidence of torture.[13]
