Trump Reveals What Kept Putin From Invading Ukraine During His Presidency

And why Biden has done more damage than "the 5 worst presidents in American history."

Nothing is more controversial about Donald Trump than his personality; even many people who supported his policies and believe he was an effective president ruefully admit that they wish he would tone it down a bit. Although, to be sure, many others were and are delighted that he is utterly sincere, even in his notorious "mean tweets," without the calculation and artifice of the average politician. On Saturday night in South Carolina, Trump went even farther, asserting that "my personality is what kept us out of war." Whatever you may think of him, he has a point.

Trump's assessment of Old Joe Biden's disastrous presidency was right on the money. "You could take the five worst presidents in American history and they would not have done the damage Joe Biden has done in just 13 months." That would be Barack Obama, Jimmy Carter, Herbert Hoover, James Buchanan and Franklin Pierce; Biden makes all of them look like candidates for Mount Rushmore. Trump was also correct in his characterization of his foundering successor. "We have a president representing our country at the most important time in history, who is physically and mentally challenged."

Biden, Trump noted, "failed to deter Russia's outrageous invasion of Ukraine." He heaped scorn on the establishment media narrative that Russia would have been even more emboldened if he were still president. "The fake news," Trump declared, "said my personality got us into a war. I'm telling you, that guy's going to get us into a war.' But actually, my personality is what kept us out of war. I was the only president in nearly four decades who did not get America into any new conflicts."

That's undeniable, and the guardians of acceptable opinion have left it unexplained, or else they simply dismiss it as dumb luck. But it was something more than that. On Feb. 22, Trump said that while he was president, he gave Putin an ultimatum. "If you move against Ukraine while I'm president, I will hit Moscow." To this, Putin responded, "No way," whereupon Trump responded, "All those beautiful golden turrets will be blown up."

Trump's claim has met with skepticism, but it's worth noting that Trump's entire threat was based on his personality as it had come to be publicly known. Putin couldn't be sure that Trump, so often described as brash, impulsive, erratic, and the like, wouldn't behave in exactly that fashion. Anyway, there is no doubt that Putin really didn't move against Ukraine during Trump's administration.

'He has trouble completing a thought': bizarre public appearances again cast doubt on Trump's mental acuity

Donald Trump's frequently bizarre public appearances, which this month have seen the president claim, wrongly, that his uncle knew the Unabomber and rant unprompted about windmills on his recent trip to the UK, have once again raised questions about his mental acuity, experts say.

For more than a year Trump, 79, has exhibited odd behavior at campaign events, in interviews, in his spontaneous remarks and at press conferences. The president repeatedly drifts off topic, including during a cabinet meeting this month when he spent 15 minutes talking about decorating, and appears to misremember simple facts about his government and his life.

Pages 2 through 5 of the documents listed the names and phone numbers of three U.S. staff members as well as the names of 13 U.S. and Russian state leaders. The list provided phonetic pronouncers for all the Russian men expected at the summit, including "Mr. President POO-tihn."

Pages 6 and 7 in the packet described how lunch at the summit would be served, and for whom. A menu included in the documents indicated that the luncheon was to be held "in honor of his excellency Vladimir Putin."

A seating chart shows that Putin and Trump were supposed to sit across from each other during the luncheon. Trump would be flanked by six officials: Secretary of State Marco Rubio, Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth and White House Chief of Staff Susie Wiles to his right, and Secretary of the Treasury Scott Bessent, Secretary of Commerce Howard Lutnick and Special Envoy for Peace Missions Steve Witkoff to his left. Putin would be seated immediately next to his Minister of Foreign Affairs, Sergey Lavrov, and his Aide to the President for Foreign Policy, Yuri Ushakov.

During the summit Friday, lunch was apparently cancelled. But it was intended to be a simple, three-course meal, the documents showed. After a green salad, the world leaders would dine on filet mignon and halibut olympia. Crème brûlée would be served for dessert.

Jon Michaels, a professor of law at UCLA who lectures about national security, said that the documents found in the printer of the Alaskan hotel reveal a lapse in professional judgment in preparation for a high-stakes meeting.

"It strikes me as further evidence of the sloppiness and the incompetence of the administration," said Michaels. "You just don't leave things in printers. It's that simple."

The printed papers are the latest example of a series of security breaches by officials of the Trump administration. Earlier this week, members of a law enforcement group chat that included members of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) <u>added</u> a random person to a conversation about an ongoing search for a convicted attempted murderer. In March, U.S. national security leaders accidentally included a journalist in a <u>group chat</u> about impending military strikes in Yemen.




Restoring the discarded name of the government's largest department could be done by an act of Congress, but the White House is considering other avenues to make the change, according to the official.





The KGB 'played the game as if they were immensely impressed by his personality', Yuri Shvets, a key source for a new book, tells the Guardian

Donald Trump was cultivated as a Russian asset over 40 years and proved so willing to parrot anti-western propaganda that there were celebrations in Moscow, a former KGB spy has told the Guardian.

Yuri Shvets, posted to Washington by the Soviet Union in the 1980s, compares the former US president to "the Cambridge five", the British spy ring that passed secrets to Moscow during the second world war and early cold war.

Now 67, Shvets is a key source for American Kompromat, a new book by journalist Craig Unger, whose previous works include House of Trump, House of Putin. The book also explores the former president's relationship with the disgraced financier Jeffrey Epstein.

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

Trump's envoy 'misunderstood' Putin's territorial demands as concessions, media report



U.S. President Donald Trump's special envoy, Steve Witkoff, "misunderstood" Russian leader Vladimir Putin, German news outlet BILD reported.

According to the outlet's sources, Witkoff's ceasefire proposal delivered to Putin in recent discussions entailed freezing the conflict along the current lines of control. In return, the Kremlin would see a broad lifting of sanctions and an offer of new economic agreements.

This offer does not satisfy the Russians, however, who still insist on full control of the eastern Luhansk and Donetsk regions and southern Zaporizhzhia and Kherson regions, Bild reported.

Russia currently occupies practically all of the Luhansk region and most of the Donetsk region, where its forces have been making creeping advances since the start of the war. These are also the only regions whose capitals are under Russian control, after Ukraine successfully liberated the city of Kherson back in November 2022.

In spite of that, Russia claims ownership of the entirety of the regions' territories based on "referendums" it carried out in areas under its control in late September 2022.

What is more, Witkoff appears to have misinterpreted some statements made by Putin as concessions. One example cited by BILD was the Russian leader's demand for a "peaceful withdrawal" of Ukrainian forces from Russian-claimed territory. Witkoff reportedly understood this as an offer of a "peaceful withdrawal" of Russian forces.

WASHINGTON, Aug 28 (Reuters) - Shortly after meeting Vladimir Putin in Moscow on August 6, U.S. special envoy Steve Witkoff delivered major news to Donald Trump: The Russian president was prepared to offer significant territorial concessions to end his war in Ukraine.

Following Witkoff's readout to the U.S. president, described by two people briefed on the matter, Trump hailed his emissary's "great progress" and agreed to hold a historic summit with Putin, indicating that a land swap was on the table.

But the diplomatic drive soon descended into confusion.

On an August 7 call with several European leaders, Witkoff indicated that Putin was willing to withdraw from the Ukrainian regions of Zaporizhzhia and Kherson in return for Kyiv ceding Donetsk and Luhansk, according to a source familiar with the exchange.

The proposal startled many of those on the call, since it departed sharply from their own assessments of Putin's position, said four people with knowledge of the discussions, including U.S and European officials who requested anonymity to discuss sensitive matters.

Witkoff appeared to change his account the next day. In a call convened by U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio with European national security advisers, the envoy said Putin was not in fact offering to withdraw from the two territories in question, according to one of the sources.

Instead, U.S. officials indicated on the call Putin had signaled lesser concessions to Washington, including that he would not demand the West formally recognize Zaporizhzhia and Kherson as Russian, said a separate U.S. official.

Reuters couldn't independently determine what was said in the Moscow meeting.

Witkoff, a real estate magnate with no background in diplomacy, broke with standard protocol by going to the meeting without a State Department notetaker and thus left without a record of Putin's precise proposals, said one source with knowledge of internal administration dynamics.

Interviews with more than a dozen U.S. and European officials flesh out the Trump administration's latest push to end the war in Ukraine, which culminated in the anti-climactic Trump-Putin summit in Alaska on August 15 that saw the leaders exchange warm words but no peace agreement.

The picture that emerges from the interviews is of an American president willing to move quickly on some foreign policy decisions, relying more on confidents and instinct than the traditional diplomatic channels and deliberative process typical of most prior administrations.

Trump's supporters say his approach has yielded breakthroughs unimaginable under his predecessor, variously citing the <u>opening</u> of U.S. relations with the new Syrian government, the bombing of Iran's nuclear facilities and the establishment of a direct line to Putin that could end a war that has killed hundreds of thousands of people.

Yet his seat-of-the-pants style has also created confusion within the administration and among allies, critics argue.

And despite the summit, the Ukrainian war is no closer to a conclusion, said Kurt Volker, a former U.S. ambassador to NATO who served as U.S. special representative for Ukraine in Trump's first term.

"We are just exactly where we were before Trump took office," Volker added. "Russia has not changed its position one iota. The war is raging on... We don't have a clear strategy of how to get Putin to stop the war."



Another myth circulated in Russia is that the country never received the gold for Alaska, as it allegedly sank in a sea storm while being transported by ship.



Situation in Ukraine: ICC judges issue arrest warrants against Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin and Maria Alekseyevna Lvova-Belova



Today, 17 March 2023, Pre-Trial Chamber II of the International Criminal Court ("ICC" or "the Court") issued warrants of arrest for two individuals in the context of the situation in Ukraine: Mr Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin and Ms Maria Alekseyevna Lvova-Belova.

Mr Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin, born on 7 October 1952, President of the Russian Federation, is allegedly responsible for the war crime of unlawful deportation of population (children) and that of unlawful transfer of population (children) from occupied areas of Ukraine to the Russian Federation (under articles 8(2)(a)(vii) and 8(2)(b)(viii) of the Rome Statute). The crimes were allegedly committed in Ukrainian occupied territory at least from 24 February 2022. There are reasonable grounds to believe that Mr Putin bears individual criminal responsibility for the aforementioned crimes, (i) for having committed the acts directly, jointly with others and/or through others (article 25(3)(a) of the Rome Statute), and (ii) for his failure to exercise control properly over civilian and military subordinates who committed the acts, or allowed for their commission, and who were under his effective authority and control, pursuant to superior responsibility (article 28(b) of the Rome Statute).

Trump administration ends program to track kidnapped Ukrainian children in Russia, lawmakers say

'We must, immediately, resume the work to help Ukraine bring these children home,' a group of Democrat lawmakers said

The U.S. State Department has ended funding for tracking thousands of Ukrainian children abducted by Russia, and a U.S. database with information on the victims may have been deleted, according to a letter U.S. lawmakers plan to send to Trump administration officials on Wednesday.

A group of Democratic U.S. lawmakers penned the letter to Secretary of State Marco Rubio and Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent, urging the administration to restore the program that helps track the abducted Ukrainian children.

The administration has ended a government-funded initiative led by Yale University's Humanitarian Research Lab that tracked the mass deportation of children from Ukraine, meaning researchers have lost access to a significant amount of information — including satellite imagery — on roughly 30,000 $\,$ children kidnapped from Ukraine.

"We have reason to believe that the data from the repository has been permanently deleted. If true, this would have devastating consequences," the letter, led by Ohio Rep. Greg Landsman, said.





Trump to abandon Russia war crimes prosecution

Washington signals end to pursuit of Putin as third anniversary of Ukraine invasion looms











The US has signalled that it could leave an international effort to prosecute Russia for invading Ukraine, The Telegraph can reveal.

US envoys refused to label Russia as an "aggressor" at a meeting of a "core group" of countries preparing a Nuremberg-style tribunal to try Vladimir Putin for his war crimes, according to Western officials.

Washington is similarly refusing to co-sponsor a United Nations statement that supports Ukraine's territorial integrity and demands Moscow to withdraw its forces from the war-torn nation.

Mr Trump's administration has also refused to sign off a planned G7 statement calling Russia the "aggressor" in the war with Ukraine to mark the third anniversary of the conflict on Monday.

The US president has blamed Ukraine for starting the war, branded Volodymyr Zelensky a "dictator" and pushed for Russia to be invited back to the alliance of industrialised nations.

European officials fear Mr Trump's flattery of Putin could lead to the Russian despot being let off the hook for his invasion as part of any peace settlement.

Donald Trump has said <u>Vladimir Putin</u> was "doing what anybody would do" after Russia launched a massive missile and drone strike on Ukraine days after the US cut off vital intelligence and military aid to Kyiv.

WASHINGTON, June 17 (Reuters) - The Trump administration shelved in recent weeks an interagency working group it had set up to formulate strategies for pressuring <u>Russia</u> into speeding up peace talks with Ukraine, according to three U.S. officials.

The effort, which was established earlier in the spring, lost steam in May as it became increasingly clear to participants that U.S. President <u>Donald Trump</u> was not interested in adopting a more confrontational stance toward Moscow, said the officials.

Despite pledging during his campaign to end the war in Ukraine on the first day of his presidency, Trump in recent months has grown increasingly frustrated that his push has yielded no breakthroughs. He has begun saying that the <u>United States</u> may abandon its efforts to broker peace altogether.

In light of that threat, the working group's task seemed increasingly irrelevant, added those officials, who requested anonymity to describe sensitive internal discussions.

"It lost steam toward the end because the president wasn't there. Instead of doing more, maybe he wanted to do less," one of the officials said.

The death of the working group, the existence of which has not been previously reported, is likely to deepen European allies' concerns over Trump's at-times conciliatory tone toward Russia and his reluctance to express full-throated support for Ukraine ahead of a pivotal summit of NATO allies later this month.

On the first day of a meeting of Group of Seven leaders in Canada on Monday, the Republican president said removing Russia from the former Group of Eight over a decade ago had been a mistake.





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

Putin agreed to allow "robust" security guarantees as part of peace deal, Trump envoy Witkoff tells CNN

Russian President Vladimir Putin agreed to allow "robust security guarantees" for Ukraine from the United States as part of a potential peace deal during his summit with President Donald Trump on Friday, top envoy Steve Witkoff told CNN today.

"We agreed to robust security guarantees that I would describe as game changing," Witkoff told Jake Tapper on "State of the Union," describing the security guarantee as an "Article 5" type protection against further Russian invasion.

He said Putin also agreed to "legislative enshrinement" by Russia to not go into any other territory, in Ukraine or elsewhere in Europe, as part of a potential peace deal.

Some context: Putin spelled out his demands for "land swaps" with Ukraine during his nearly three-hour summit with US President Donald Trump Friday, including his insistence Ukraine gives up the Donbas region in eastern Ukraine, according to European officials familiar with Trump's accounting of the meeting to his counterparts afterward.

Putin said in exchange, he would be willing to freeze the current front lines in the rest of Ukraine — in the regions of Kherson and Zaporizhzhia — and agree to a promise not to attack Ukraine or other European nations again.

But he didn't back away from a demand to eliminate what Russia calls the "root causes" of the war in Ukraine — code for reducing the size of Kyiv's military, abandoning its aspirations to join NATO and becoming a neutral state.



Russia's Federal Budget Puts Economy on War Footing

On 27 November 2023, Russian President Putin signed the federal budget for 2024-2026. The budget dedicates a dramatic 30 percent of total expenditures to the Armed Forces and military industrial complex. According to the excerpted article from the Russian and English-language independent online newspaper The Moscow Times, the increase in funds dedicated to the military establishment is "2.3 times more than [was appropriated] in 2022." For comparison, funds dedicated to the military represented only 17 percent of the federal budget in 2022 and 19 percent in 2023. That percentage will increase to 29.5 percent in 2024. The Russian government will also spend "another 3.338 trillion rubles under the heading 'national security,' which includes the budgets of the Ministry of Internal Affairs, the National Guard, the special services and the FSIN1 system. Thus, in total, nearly "40 percent of the [federal] budget will be spent on law enforcement agencies."

To make this happen, Russia will

have to pull funds from other parts of its economy including healthcare (which will be cut by 10 percent), aid to small businesses (which will lose 20 percent), and the "development of Infrastructure for Scientific Research," (which will be reduced by 25 percent). Notably, "funding for state propaganda," a line item of Russia's fedral budget and a critical part of its war in Ukraine, would remain the same as in the last budget. The signing into law of the new budget comes in conjunction with multiple other significant financial changes, including the Russian

reintroduction of capital controls² to stabilize the ruble against the dollar and other global currencies.³ Taken together, the signaling demonstrates Russia's determination to see the war to a positive outcome—at a time when funding for Ukraine in the U.S. and among other Western powers is under scrutiny.



It will also illustrate how the blame NATO claim intersects with much of Putin's historical mythmaking, which posits a cooperative Russia as a victim of an ever-expanding existential threat, while providing cover for Putin's evolving redemptive, expansionist worldview. Trump said in Alaska he and Putin had agreed on most points. It would mean relinquishing the belt of towns and fortifications as well as rivers and ridge lines that have enabled Ukraine to resist Russia's advances and help protect the rest of the country. Giving up this land would plunge Ukraine into political turmoil and leave it badly exposed to further Russian aggression.

Pentagon Has Quietly Blocked Ukraine's Long-Range Missile Strikes on Russia

The Defense Department has withheld approval for attacks as the White House has sought to entice Moscow to open peace talks

WASHINGTON—The Pentagon has for months been blocking Ukraine's use of longrange missiles to strike inside Russia, U.S. officials said, limiting Kyiv from employing a powerful weapon in its fight against Moscow's invasion.

A high-level Defense Department approval procedure, which hasn't been announced, has prevented Ukraine from firing any U.S.-made long-range Army Tactical Missile Systems, or Atacms, against targets in Russia since late spring, the officials said. On at least one occasion, Ukraine sought to use Atacms against a target on Russian territory but was rejected, two officials said.
